

10 MUST VISIT Waterfalls

Luckily, Northeast Tennessee is filled with beautiful rivers and streams, many of which flow into waterfalls of all shapes and sizes, from surging cascades to plunging showers. Whether you're in the mood for an all-day trek, or a short hike, you can venture through Northeast Tennessee without the crowds.

JONES FALLS 36.2031° N, 81.9816° W

This 100-foot waterfall is situated between Roan Mountain, Tennessee, and Elk Park, North Carolina. The estimated length for this hike is about 7 miles round-trip, with the approach hike taking a bit longer due to substantial elevation gain.

BUCKEYE FALLS

36.0876° N. 82.5751° W

This massive cascade is perhaps one of the most mysterious and elusive falls in the Southeast. Located in Clarks Creek Recreation Area, Buckeye Falls is often called the highest waterfall east of the Mississippi, with height estimates ranging from 475 to 700 feet. Though the hike to the falls isn't terribly long at 3.5 miles. Please use caution, hiking to Buckeye Falls can be dangerous.

COON DEN FALLS




There are a couple of ways to arrive at Coon Den Falls, but we prefer the 4-mile loop along the Appalachian Trail. The glistening 50-foot waterfall is tucked away in the Roan Mountain area, which is known in spring for its blooms of rhododendron and a wide variety of wildflowers, including trillium.

ELROD FALLS

36.4353° N, 83.2464° W

Elrod Falls offers a huge payoff for a tiny hike. Located just 10 minutes outside of Sneedville. the waterfall can be accessed at the end of a gravel road off of state Route 31. There's a picnic area at the trailhead, and a 0.1-mile path will lead you down to the cascading waterfall and its two swimming holes.







GENTRY CREEK FALLS

36.5676° N, 81.7048° W

The 4.5-mile out-and-back hike follows Gentry Creek and weaves through rhododendron on the way to the 60-foot falls. This impressive, twotiered waterfall is located near Mountain City.

LAUREL FALLS

36.2640° N. 82.1231° W

The majority of the trail to Laurel Falls is relatively flat and easy. It is perhaps one of the most popular waterfall hikes in the region and located in Hampton. The area around the waterfall is perfect for a picnic and a good cool down before the tough climb back out.

LOWER HIGGINS CREEK FALLS 36.0888° N. 82.5333° W

For a less-traveled waterfall experience, make your way to Erwin. The main section of the falls flows 100 feet. You'll walk about 1 mile along Lower Higgins Creek, with a bit of steep hiking near the end, to reach the main falls.

MARGARETTE FALLS


36.0711° N, 82.7185° W

Among Northeast Tennessee's most popular waterfalls, this trail is just under 3 miles round-trip and is a gorgeous spot. Along the way, you'll catch glimpses of several smaller waterfalls before reaching the main viewpoint for Margarette Falls.

PINE RIDGE FALLS AND SILL BRANCH FALLS

36.1253° N, 82.5377° W

Just outside of Erwin in the Clarks Creek area, Sill Branch Falls and Pine Ridge Falls are local favorites for their stunning rock features and easy access. Each waterfall is about a 1 mile out-and-back hike offering lovely streamside walking with a gradual incline.



Stephen Callahan knows a thing or two about alcohol – and about making dreams come true. Growing up in Jonesborough, he and his brothers had a true interest in brewing beer. Callahan attended Emory & Henry College where he majored in biology and chemistry. His intent was to go to medical school, but when his father fell ill, he decided to stay close to home and help out on the family farm. He ultimately went to work at Eastman, as a chemist, and was soon accepted into Lincoln Memorial Medical School.

Yet, he had never truly stopped thinking about his passion for making alcohol. He looked for work as a distiller but nobody would hire him. "That's all I really wanted to do," said Callahan. "I knew I was good at it and I feel like I found my passion pretty early in life. I didn't want to give up on it. But I was considered too young (25) and I was over-educated. I was pretty much a chemist trying to be a distiller."

In October of 2014 he heard that the iconic Salt House in Jonesborough was available for purchase after having sat empty for 15 years. Callahan knew what he wanted to do so he

made a call to the mayor of Jonesborough and asked him what he thought about opening a distillery in Tennessee's oldest town. By fall of 2015, Tennessee Hills Distillery was up and running.

"I try to tell everybody they should have initiative and to find one thing that makes them want to get out of bed every day, and then try to get paid for it," said Callahan. "It's all about leaving a legacy for me and especially here in Tennessee's oldest town. To come in and be the young guy who shakes things up, and a year later be the number one business on Trip Advisor...that's pretty amazing."

"My wife and I enjoy what we do and we're blessed," he said. "But we also have a really solid foundation of local customers. That's the beauty of what we do – the customers are so great. I've come to know so many on a first name basis and they buy into what we're doing. That's what makes all of this so special – that group of customers got us through one year and into the second and if it weren't for them we wouldn't be here."

The Long Island Iced Tea was first made in Kingsport on Long Island of the Holston River during the Prohibition era by Charles Bishop, aka "Old Man Bishop."



TRITAN FROM EASTMAN

Tritan plastic, produced in Kingsport, is used in hundreds of food contact products around the world, including water bottles, blenders and food storage containers.



COMIC ILLUSTRATIONS

Charles Vess, from Abingdon, has illustrated Marvel Comics (including cover art for The Amazing Spider-Man), DC Comics (Swamp Thing), and the Sandman series written by Neil Gaiman. He also illustrated the Gaiman novel Stardust.



WATAUGA LAKE WINERY ▶

2 GRAY FOSSIL SITE

The Gray Fossil Site is a place where visitors can view and learn about an active Plioceneera fossil dig site. Scientists believe the site was formed by an underground limestone cave that collapsed and created a sinkhole. This left a vast fossil deposit that dates back approximately 5 million years.

3 BRISTOL MOTOR SPEEDWAY

Bristol Motor Speedway, known among race fans as "The Last Great Colosseum," is located in Bristol. The popular motorsports venue hosts NASCAR Cup series and other racing events annually. The nearby Bristol Dragway, known as "Thunder Valley" due to the acoustics created by its location, also hosts numerous events.




5 KINGSPORT AQUATIC CENTER

6 ANDREW JOHNSON NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE



For decades, the Nolichucky River has been popular with rafting enthusiasts who just can't wait to hit the thrilling rapids in one of the most beautiful spots in the Southeast.

For much of that time Matt Moses has been right there on the banks of the Nolichucky with the wildly popular rafting business, USA Raft. Its popularity, in fact, led Moses to expand his business, now called Mountain River Guides. No longer is the business just about rafting the Nolichucky River Gorge – although that continues to bring folks in by droves. These days, Mountain River Guides also provides guests with cave tours, standup paddleboard lessons, and guided fly fishing trips and lessons.

"We're more than rafting," said Moses. "We've repositioned ourselves so that we're now an all-inclusive provider. I wanted to provide more work for the staff, I wanted to offer more experiences for the guests and I wanted to keep them here longer to share the beauty of Northeast Tennessee with them," said Moses. "We wanted to get away from just being a

one-day experience and we wanted to expose them to all that we have to offer."

Guests come from all over the United States, and from quite a few other countries too.

"Last year we had 13 guests from Alaska, 48 from California and a bus load from Minnesota," said Moses. "Our top states are North Carolina, Tennessee, South Carolina, Florida and Kentucky but we've had guests from every state. We also have visitors from England, Australia, Holland... all over the place."

What was once a seasonal endeavor is now open year-round, something Moses is also very excited about.

"It used to be that during the winter months I was the only one around," he said. "Now that we've added all these other activities, we've got four full-time people through the winter and a number of guides working part-time."

"We've shifted the dynamic of seasonal jobs to keeping people employed longer, having guests stay longer and giving them more to enjoy about beautiful Northeast Tennessee."

Paramount Bristol opened in 1931. Its dazzling interiors and iconic marquee were characteristic of the Paramount Pictures chain of Art Deco movie palaces. After an ambitious restoration in 1991, the Paramount reopened as a sparkling new performance facility, equipped for all manner of stage presentations from ballet to Broadway musicals.

ROCKY MOUNT STATE HISTORIC SITE

Rocky Mount is a two-story log house built in the late 1820s, and is located on the former property of William Cobb in Piney Flats. Today, visitors can step back into the year 1791 and gain an appreciation for the daily lifestyle of a frontier family as costumed interpreters invite guests into the restored house. Visitors discover the daily chores in the kitchen, barn, weaving cabin, gardens and sheep.

SYCAMORE SHOALS STATE HISTORIC PARK

The park's visitor center features interpretive exhibits highlighting the history of the late 18th century, an Eastern National bookstore and a gift shop. 

Deborah Montanti has been involved with historic preservation in Northeast Tennessee for more than 25 years, with 16 of those as Executive Director of the Heritage Alliance of Northeast Tennessee and Southwest Virginia.

The Heritage Alliance is dedicated to preservation of the region's architectural, historical and cultural assets, while also operating two museums in Jonesborough, the Chester Inn state owned historic site and the Jonesborough/ Washington County History Museum, as well as playing a role in the development and operation of the Chuckey Depot train museum. They also provide walking tours, cemetery tours, a one-room school house and several theatrical pieces dedicated to the history of Jonesborough and Washington County.

Montanti admits she has been a history buff her entire life and works to combine her passion for the past with education and conservation. "History has always fascinated me. I was one of

those kids who needed to understand the why of everything. History helps us do that. When I left corporate life in 1993, I entered the world of history museums and have been wandering around in them ever since."

It's no coincidence that Montanti landed in the oldest town in Tennessee, also known as the Storytelling Capital of the World. "Every day, I get to learn from and connect to ordinary men and women who have helped to form this region. And I get to share those stories with new people who will help to form the region as it will be. Past present and future. What's not to love?"

Montanti admits that a day in the life of historic preservation can be crazy, almost as crazy as some of the characters whose stories she tells. "There are a lot of interesting tales in Washington County and beyond. Northeast Tennessee has always been home to folks who dance to a different drummer. I think the craziest true story is still being written," Montanti said.

IT'S ALWAYS PLAY TIME IN ABINGDON

Visitors to the picturesque Blue Ridge Mountain town of Abingdon are typically looking for some serious play time. Whether the play is on stage at Barter Theatre, the state theatre of Virginia, or in the great outdoor playground of the Blue Ridge Mountains, it's always play time in Abingdon.

The Virginia Creeper Trail starts in downtown Abingdon and owes its unusual name to the old steam engines that slowly labored up the steep mountain grades with heavy loads of lumber and iron ore. The multi-purpose trail runs along a railroad right-of-way that dates back to the 1880s, and is used by walkers, runners, horseback riders and bikers. Numerous bike rental shops will shuttle riders to the highest point on the trail for a modest fee. The easy downhill ride and awesome views of the Mount Rogers area make The Virginia Creeper Trail a family favorite.

The Appalachian Trail runs through the nearby Mount Rogers National Recreation Area, and offers some of the most unique terrain in Virginia with wild ponies grazing on the grassy bald knobs and views that extend to North Carolina.

The Barter Theatre in downtown Abingdon attracts people from all over the country. When it first opened its doors during the Great Depression, patrons could buy a ticket by bartering produce or livestock. The theatre became known as a launching pad for rising stars like Gregory Peck, Patricia Neal, Ernest Borgnine, or Ned Beatty. Eight decades later, this professional theatre performs year-round in two unique venues, and is still the epicenter of Abingdon's cultural life.

Main Street and Historic Downtown Abingdon are perfect for those whose idea of play time includes shopping, nightlife or live music. The historic downtown district is filled with unique shops and galleries. A craft brewery and winery are nearby. Abingdon also offers culinary adventures with a food scene that is rooted in Appalachian traditions. Mountain trout, stone ground grits, heirloom apples and pastured pork products are on the menu at Abingdon's 34 independently owned restaurants.



Barter Theatre has wowed audiences for 85 years. Today, Barter is one of the last yearround, professional, resident repertory theaters remaining in the United States. With the annual season running from February through December, and with on average two shows on each of the two stages, there is almost certainly something for everyone at Barter Theatre yearround.

The performances are some of the most anticipated events in the region bringing in patrons from all over the country. Barter offers a wide variety of genres from comedies and family-centric shows, to scary thrillers meant to keep audiences on the edge of their seats. Some of the most famous and beloved musicals and shows in entertainment history have been performed at Barter Theatre such as Mamma Mia, Footloose: The Musical, The Wizard of Oz, and A Christmas Carroll just to name a few.

With the caliber of show performances at Barter, you can imagine, the number of outstanding actors that have graced the Barter Theatre stage throughout the decades. A few on the list of famous actors include Gregory Peck, Ernest

Borgnine, Ned Beatty, Larry Linville, Wayne Knight, Jim Varney, Gary Collins and Patricia Neal.

But how did this unique place get started? By the vision of an enterprising young man named Robert Porterfield. The year was 1933, and the country was going through the Great Depression. Porterfield had started his career as an actor in New York, but the declining economy made work and food scarce. As Porterfield and his fellow actors were struggling to get by, he thought of his home region of Southwest Virginia where food was abundant, but there was a lack of live theatre. From this, the idea of Barter Theatre was born. Porterfield recruited his fellow professional actors from New York and brought them to Abingdon.

He wanted to provide cultural nourishment in exchange for bodily nourishment. Through this idea, "With the vegetables you cannot sell, you can buy a good laugh," the Barter Theatre opened its doors on June 10, 1933. By the time the lights went down for the premiere of "After Tomorrow," the cast was playing to a full house of local residents who had paid admission of 35 cents or the equivalent in produce, which then went to feed the hungry actors. At the end of the first season, the Barter Company cleared \$4.35 in cash, two barrels of jelly and enjoyed a collective weight gain of more than 300 pounds.

As the economy improved, a higher percentage of patrons began paying in cash and by 1939 cash customers began to outnumber those who bartered. Each year, Barter Theatre celebrates its heritage with Barter Days. For a few select performances, patrons are invited to barter for admission by bringing the equivalent amount of canned food. All food gathered is then donated to a local charity. The theatre's annual Barter Days event is held every June. In the past, Barter Theatre collected as much as 6.000 pounds of food in just three days from this event.

Barter Theatre strives to keep many of the original traditions alive. Bob Porterfield was famous for his curtain talks, where he would take the stage to talk about the beloved theatre and give a gift to patrons that had traveled the longest distance to attend the play. Today this tradition is still honored and is a memorable part of attending a show at Barter's Gilliam stage. Much has changed, but the core values, the very soul of Barter, remain the same.

Behind the scenes, Barter uses full-time artisans and technicians in its professional costume, properties and scene shops, as well as in lighting and sound design. Across the organization, Barter has approximately 130 full-time employees, and more than 200 and counting part-time staff, making it one of Abingdon's 10th largest

It is also essential for Barter to be accessible to everyone. Because of this, Barter has ticket prices starting as low as \$20 for every show.



WHO SAYS YOU CAN'T BE IN TWO PLACES AT ONCE?

Bristol is built on sound: engines revving, fiddles singing and the silence of the outdoors. The downtown buzzes with live music and the outdoors quietly await just beyond. Nestled in the Appalachian Mountains and surrounded by scenic South Holston Lake and the Holston River sits Bristol – The Birthplace of Country Music and home of the "Last Great Colosseum" – Bristol Motor Speedway.

Any first-time visitor's journey to Bristol should start downtown at the state line on State Street. Tennessee and Virginia are divided by brass markers and double yellow lines and are the ultimate photo opp. Historic downtown Bristol has been "A Good Place to Live" since 1856 and proof of that is the historic Bristol Sign, which has spanned State Street since 1915. Other

downtown gems that can't be missed include the Bristol Train Station, built in 1902, the Paramount Center for the Arts, which opened in 1931, the Birthplace of Country Music Museum, and an array of locally-owned restaurants, shops, and art galleries

The Birthplace of Country Music Museum, a Smithsonian-affiliated museum, opened in 2014 and honors Bristol's musical roots, which began with the historic 1927 Bristol Sessions. The museum tells the story of the sessions' recordings, explores how evolving technology shaped their success and highlights how this rich musical heritage lives on in today's music. One of the premier music festivals in the Southeast, Bristol Rhythm and Roots Reunion, takes place downtown each September. The annual three-day

festival features more than 150 artists the third weekend of September and draws in excess of 50,000 music lovers.

It's Bristol Baby! You can't miss The Last Great Colosseum – Bristol Motor Speedway, which opened in 1961, and has long been one of NASCAR's most popular tracks. It draws fans from all 50 states and more than two dozen countries to its highly anticipated April and August events every year. Bristol Dragway, which opened in 1965, hosts one of the most anticipated NHRA races of the year for drag racing fans every Father's Day weekend, the Thunder Valley Nationals. The setting of the dragstrip, in a valley between the mountains, makes for some of the most unique sounds in the sport when dragsters rumble down the track in excess of 330 mph.





As the gateway to the region's outdoors, Bristol is home to world class fly fishing waters, mountain bike trails and hiking year-round. South Holston Lake, one of the most visited lakes in Tennessee. is perfect for swimming, boating, fishing or waterskiing. The bass fishing on the lake is topnotch and the Holston River is considered one of the top fly fishing waters in the country. There are also a number of city parks that offer plenty of trails for biking and hiking, along with picnic areas. There are several public golf courses, one of which is at Steele Creek Park, which also features a Nature Center, seasonally run kids train, splash pad and paddle boating. Sugar Hollow Park and Whitetop Creek Park are multi-purpose sports complexes with plenty of trails and picnic shelters. Bristol also boasts two caverns: Bristol Caverns and Appalachian Caverns, which can be accessed year-round.

Home to many locally owned and chain restaurants, Bristol has some of the best BBQ and burgers you can find. The famed Burger Bar is among Bristol's top locally-owned eateries, with other favorites including 620 State, Bloom Café and Listening Room, Stateline Bar & Grill, Machiavelli's, The Angry Italian, Southern Churn and Blackbird Bakery. Bristol boasts mouthwatering craft beer at Studio Brew, Holston River Brewing Company, Elderbrew and Bristol Station Brew & Taproom. Two new distilleries are coming to Bristol: Appalachian Heritage (open now) and Lost State (open in 2019).

Stay in or near our downtown to enjoy live music any night of the week and during the day, get lost on the lake or on a trail and shop at our locally owned stores or nationally known favorites at the Pinnacle or the Falls.

Why do I love thee, Bristol Motor Speedway? Let me count the ways.

We hope Elizabeth Barrett Browning will pardon the paraphrase, but it is a legitimate question for those who love Bristol Motor Speedway and the spectacular environs in which it sits. Especially in late August as the Northeast Tennessee summer is coming to an end and the colorful fall is just around the corner.

And the answer? Well it isn't simple and it isn't short.

And much of that growth, that popularity can be tied to the track's August night-racing extravaganza, the Bass Pro Shops NRA Night Race.

Words really cannot do justice to the spectacle that is The Night Race. It's not just a race. It's a feeling, an emotion-filled, sensory-overloaded experience that has to be lived to be believed. A Bristol night race ticket is one of the most coveted in all of racing. Fans begin populating the rolling hills around the track many days before the event, villages of campers by race day growing into cities of RVs, tents and every imaginable camping structure.

Don't let the length of the track fool you. Sure, it's just a little over a half-mile in length but throw in banking of over 33 degrees and you end up with racing many drivers have described as "flying fighter jets in a gymnasium." The result? Speeds over 130 mph, cars racing inches apart running on the ragged edge. All that means frayed tempers, wrecked race cars and often, retribution.

As if the most amazing racing on the Monster Energy NASCAR Cup Series isn't enough to complete a fan's experience, BMS offers much more to make your August stay more enjoyable.

There's Colossus, the world's largest centerhung TV screen offering a can't-miss view of all the racing action in the Last Great Colosseum. It sports four massive high-resolution screens and a half-million watt, 485-speaker sound system that puts the sights and sounds of the night right into your lan



GREENEVILLE

Greeneville is a vacation destination like no other! Home of 17th President of the United States Andrew Johnson and the birthplace of celebrated hero David Crockett, Greeneville combines a progressive approach to the future with a distinctive drive to promote and preserve its unique heritage.

Visitors may tour Johnson's early home and homestead, wander through exhibits in the museums and be witness to the spirit that was our 17th President as they explore his tailor shop where he worked and vigorously discussed issues of that very troubled period in our country.

HISTORICAL SITES

Andrew Johnson Tailor Shop and Museum

The Visitor Center features his presidential museum and original Tailor Shop where many spirited debates took place.

Early Home and Homestead

The home depicts Johnson's early life, the purchase of his first slaves, and his introduction into the political world. The Homestead was owned by Johnson for 24 years before and after his presidency.

National Cemetery

The 17th President was laid to rest in this cemetery, one of the highest peaks in Greeneville, along with his family.

Statue of Andrew Johnson

Sculpted by Jim Gray, the figure of the 17th President is mounted on the corner of College and Depot Streets.

David Crockett Birthplace State Park

Free your imagination to examine the wilderness of East Tennessee in the 19th Century through one of its best known trailblazers, David Crockett. The park features a replica of the cabin in which Crockett was born, complete with a footstone from the original cabin. Guests can garner more insights to the historical figure from the Visitor's Center and Museum, or experience a taste of the outdoors at the campsites, swimming pool, three scenic picnic areas, or at the boating access to the Nolichucky River which flows peacefully along the park shores.

General Morgan Inn & Conference Center

Feel the strife of a community torn asunder by

the heartbreak of Civil War as you see the site and hear the story of the carnage of General John Hunt Morgan by Yankee soldiers in 1864 behind the now-renovated railroad hotel.

Niswonger Performing Arts Center

Continue your tour in historic downtown by visiting our very own 1,135-seat, state-of-the-art facility that has hosted acts from Gladys Knight to the Oak Ridge Boys and Kenny Rogers and has been recognized nationally as a leading entertainment venue for performing artists and theatrical productions.



JOHNSON CITY

When it comes to outdoor experiences, Johnson City has something for everyone. From walking and hiking trails for those who like to go on foot, to worldclass mountain biking, there's no shortage of excitement here. Hiking trails and walking paths weave through the area, and an abundance of streams, lakes, and rivers give water enthusiasts endless options for adventure.

What makes Johnson City the BEST place for outdoor adventure? PROXIMITY. This is what sets us apart. From the heart of our downtown, which is filled with restaurants, breweries, shops, and live music, you can take advantage of so many adventures within a short distance.

TANNERY KNOBS MOUNTAIN BIKE PARK

Within riding distance of downtown Johnson City, Tannery Knobs covers more than 40 acres of heavily wooded terrain. Designed as a true skills park for all ages, riders can experience the thrill of off-road riding in a progressive environment. All trails and features have been professionally designed and built, ensuring enthusiasts and

beginners alike will find the perfect ride. The park has the IMBA seal of approval as well. But Tannery Knobs is more than just bikes! Take in the amazing views, hike, or run the trails; the park has something everyone. Featuring endless mountain views, the 300-foot ridgeline overlooks Johnson City's historic Appalachian charm.

TWEETSIE TRAIL

The Tweetsie Trail is a 10-mile rails-to-trails project traversing the former ET&WNC Tweetsie railroad right-of-way between Johnson City and Elizabethton. The trail provides opportunities for walking, hiking, running, and biking on a relatively flat grade in a beautiful, natural setting. There are seven scenic bridges along the trail and benches to let you rest and take in the scenery.

BUFFALO MOUNTAIN PARK

Buffalo Mountain Park is a 725-acre natural resource that offers developed paths that are reached from the south side of Johnson City. The park offers 8.2 miles of hiking trails: a 1.100foot rise from the picnic area to the top can be challenging. The White Rock Loop is a very strenuous, three-mile hike through beautiful hardwood forest. Huckleberry Knob is a moderate hike with the reward of picturesque views of the city when you reach the top. All mileage is measured from the picnic area.

ADDITIONAL HIKING TRAILS:

Appalachian Trail

Though it hugs the North Carolina border for nearly 200 miles, the Appalachian Trail doesn't officially cross into Tennessee until it reaches the Nolichucky River at the Nantahala Outdoor Center (about four miles outside Erwin). On this section, elevations frequently exceed 5,000 feet.

Lacy Trap and Laurel Fork Trails

These trails are a very strenuous 15-mile-loop hike on the Appalachian Trail. Follow US/19E Bypass southeast from Elizabethton, toward Roan Mountain and Boone. At Hampton, the routes separate; turn left and follow US 321/67 to trail.

Pinnacle Firetower Hike

Exit 32. in the Town of Unicoi. From this trailhead vantage point, Pinnacle Mountain Trail #25 winds its way up the mountain at grades the whole family can enjoy.

The Southern Dozen is a collection of 12 rides and one bonus ride based in Johnson City that travel all around the region. Whether you feel like exploring caves, seeing wolves, touring historic sites, leaning into heartpounding curves, or just taking in the views, you'll find a ride that's exactly what you're looking for.

THE STORYTELLING CAPITAL

On a warm October weekend in 1973 in Historic Jonesborough, the first National Storytelling Festival was held. Hay bales and wagons were the stages, and audience and tellers together didn't number more than 60. It was tiny, but something happened that weekend that forever changed our culture, this traditional art form, and Tennessee's Oldest Town.

The Festival, now in its 47th year and acclaimed as one of the Top 100 Events in North America, conjures up nearly 11,000 visitors from all fifty states. There's a certain magic about the festival, a magic that shuts off smart phones and holds folks spellbound in the art of well-told stories by dozens of the world's best storytellers.

Known as the Storytelling Capital of the World, Jonesborough offers a storied experience yearround. From town-wide Christmas events during December, to our festivals and concert series offering live music each week, to live storytelling performances all year long, visitors are sure to delight in our charm. You're invited to experience Jonesborough and the people that call it home all while leaving your footprint on the story that's still being written.

CATCH LIVE MUSIC

While in the heart of the Appalachian Mountains, your visit to Historic Jonesborough wouldn't be complete without attending our Music on the Square weekly concert series. Grab a lawn chair or a blanket and enjoy live music with the townscape of downtown Jonesborough as the setting. Music on the Square features a variety of music that ranges from americana, bluegrass, celtic, irish, old-time, blues and jazz. Held each

Friday evening, May through September, local and regional bands, storytellers, poets and performance artists provide the weekly line-up of live entertainment.

If you are lucky enough to be in town on a Sunday, spend your afternoon trying local craft beer and foods while hearing some great bands at Main Street Brews and Tunes starting in June. To see what drink is on tap and what artist will have your toes tapping, check out their schedule.

DISCOVER ART

Jonesborough Repertory Theatre is the place to find rich dramas, playful comedies to impactful musicals. Since 1970, the Theatre has remained a regional favorite by offering productions yearround

In keeping with the towns efforts of revitalization and preservation, Jonesborough is embarking on an exciting new preservation project with a full restoration of its 1940's Jackson Theatre. The facility will serve as a music venue, a theatre, and an independent film house.

Immerse yourself in fine art exhibits, artful events, workshops and classes, at the McKinney Center at the Booker T. Washington School. This arts mecca is sure to ignite your creative side with their various programs and events.

The world-renowned National Storytelling Festival, produced by the International Storytelling Center (ISC), takes place the first weekend in October. You can also visit ISC during Storytelling Live!, a program that brings a new teller-in-residence to the town each week for daily performances, May-October.

Storytelling has a forever home in Jonesborough with the Jonesborough Storytellers Guild that was created to help others find and share stories through its support of the oral tradition of storytelling. Jonesborough is home to the only Guild in the United States with a weekly performance venue. The Storytelling Resource Place is also located downtown and serves as a

hub of resources and artifacts related to the art

The Jonesborough Yarn Exchange, our original storytelling radio hour helps to harvest, craft, and share stories. The award-winning production, "A Night with the Yarn Exchange", is a monthly live radio performance at the International Storytelling Center celebrating the culture, history, and stories of the people of Jonesborough and the Southern Appalachian Region.

UNCOVER HISTORY AND HERITAGE

History comes to life in this 18th century town. Its well-preserved Main Street will take you on a beautiful journey through the past. One of the best ways to experience Jonesborough is by taking a town tour with our preservation society, the Heritage Alliance. Your tour guide, dressed in period clothing, will escort you through the streets of Jonesborough sharing little-known facts and the story of the town from past to present. Also, be sure to pay a visit to the Chester Inn Museum, located in the heart of downtown Jonesborough. The museum chronicles the history of Jonesborough from its inception in 1779 to the present.

Jonesborough is a town filled with ma and pop shops, friendly faces, farm to table foods, plenty of "y'alls" and "come back agains". Whether you live 50 or 5,500 miles away, you are sure to feel right at home in Tennessee's oldest town.









Racks by the Tracks

This BBQ, microbrew and music festival is a favorite among locals and visitors. Chefs take to the grill to offer up their tasty selections in hopes of bringing home an award. Breweries from around the region bring their unique microbrews for one large beer tasting garden.

Fun Fest

Kingsport's nine-day festival packs in over 100 events for all ages each July. Visitors will enjoy a hot air balloon rally, the world's fastest 8k race, "The Taste"-food truck/vendor full of flavor and a host of fun events. The Sunset Concert Series closes out the final three nights of the festival and features well-known artist performances and a huge firework finale.

Downtown Kingsport Wine Festival

Held in October, the festival is sanctioned by the Tennessee Farm Wine Growers Association and features a dozen wineries from across Tennessee. They provide samples as visitors enjoy rich wines, music, foods, and shopping local artisans.







THE MOUNTAIN TOWN FILLED WITH HISTORY

ROGERSVILLE


Where else can you walk with Presidents, preachers, and poets? Since 1775, folks from all over have been discovering what it means to unlock the secrets to Historic Rogersville. Whether it's the beautiful mountains, scenic rivers, lakes and streams, or the unique history experience, you'll want to stay a lifetime in Rogersville. There's plenty to do, and the only thing you'll worry about is what to do first.

Listed on the National Register of Historic Places, Rogersville's unique original red-brick Main Street is known as the largest collection of Federal style architecture in the State. The district includes the Tennessee's oldest courthouse, Hale Springs Inn, the Crockett family's first Tennessee home, and the site where Tennessee's first newspaper was printed in 1791, along with five Tennessee state historical markers. Hale Springs Inn was built in 1824 in the heart of downtown Rogersville, with nine spaciously appointed quest rooms and suites. The three presidential

suites were all named after presidents which have been previous guests to the Inn: Andrew Jackson, Andrew Johnson and James Polk. Connected to the Inn, you'll find McKinney's Restaurant & Tavern, named in honor of John McKinney who built Hale Springs Inn.

In neighboring city, Bulls Gap, you'll find the Archie Campbell Tourism Complex including 27 structures such as the Old Country Store, Gilley's Hotel and the Archie Campbell Museum – all tracing the area's Civil War and railroad history. Grand Ole Opry Star Archie Campbell helped put his hometown, Bulls Gap, "on the map" to millions of television viewers.

Rogersville is also home to the oldest stone dam in Tennessee as well as Capt. Thomas Amis. Amis Mill Eatery, is the most unique and historical restaurant in Northeast Tennessee. Sit on a deck overlooking a waterfall while savoring fresh smoked prime rib, seafood, burgers, Cajun cuisine, and homemade desserts.




